



KATAR SHAWL

Inspired by the shape of Katar, an ancient weapon from Indian subcontinent. It consisted of a pointed blade and a handle: it was used as , an hand arm. Later it evolved to a more dangerous and lethal weapon, with an internal mechanism which divided the blade into two or three points.

Knitting needles: 120 cm circular or straight: 10 mm
Yarn Zoe di Borgo de Pazzi Firenze® - 500 gr
Notes: 8 Stitch marks needed, big enough for the 10 mm needles.

Stitches:

K knit
P purl
m stitch marker
am add stitch marker
pm pass stitch marker
K2Tog: knit 2 sts together
K2Tog tbl: knit 2 together through back loop
YO : yarn over
Elastic Cast Off : K2Tog tbl, *pass the stitch from right needle to left needle - K2Tog tbl* - repeat for tot sts
ON: Odd needle
EN: even needle



Execution:

Cast on 5 sts

1- K1, am, yo, K1, am, yo, K1, yo, am, k1, am, yo, k1- Total 9 sts

2- Knit accross

3- K1, pm, yo, k1, am, yo, k1, yo, am, k1, pm, yo, k1, yo, pm, k1, am, yo, k1, yo, am, k1, pm, yo, k1
Total: 17 sts

4- Knit accross

Continue as follows:

- All ODD needles:

k1, pm, yo, knit to m, pm, yo, k1, yo, m, knit to m, pm, yo, k1, yo, m, knit to m, pm, yo, k1, yo, m, knit to m, pm, yo, k1

- All EVEN needles: Knit accross

When you have 266 on EVEN n.:

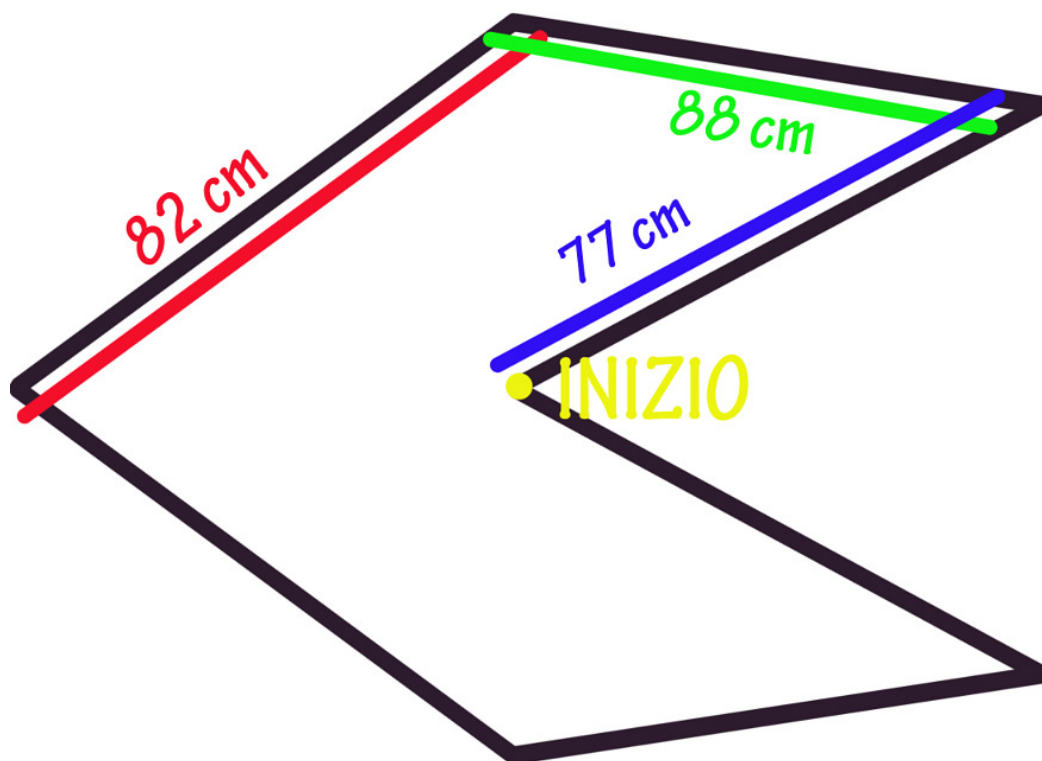
ON: k1, (K2Tog, k1) for 132 times, k1

EN: knit accross

ON: elastic cast off

Finishing:

Weave-in all ends. Block as per below instructions.



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
